It's a boy, let's call him Eli. He lives in a small town somewhere between Nebraska and Iowa, in what is often referred to as "heartland", even if the hearts there sometimes beat very quietly. Eli is seventeen, drives a pickup truck that rusts more than it rolls, and has an old mobile phone with a cracked screen that runs TikTok when the diner's wifi is sufficient.

He has the feeling that he has been placed somewhere like in a play whose plot has already been written.

And when we spoke, I had the impression that his anger was a mask that actually concealed a huge need: to be needed. That his questions were never really asked, but that he was only ever defending himself against a silence that was bigger than he was.



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
