

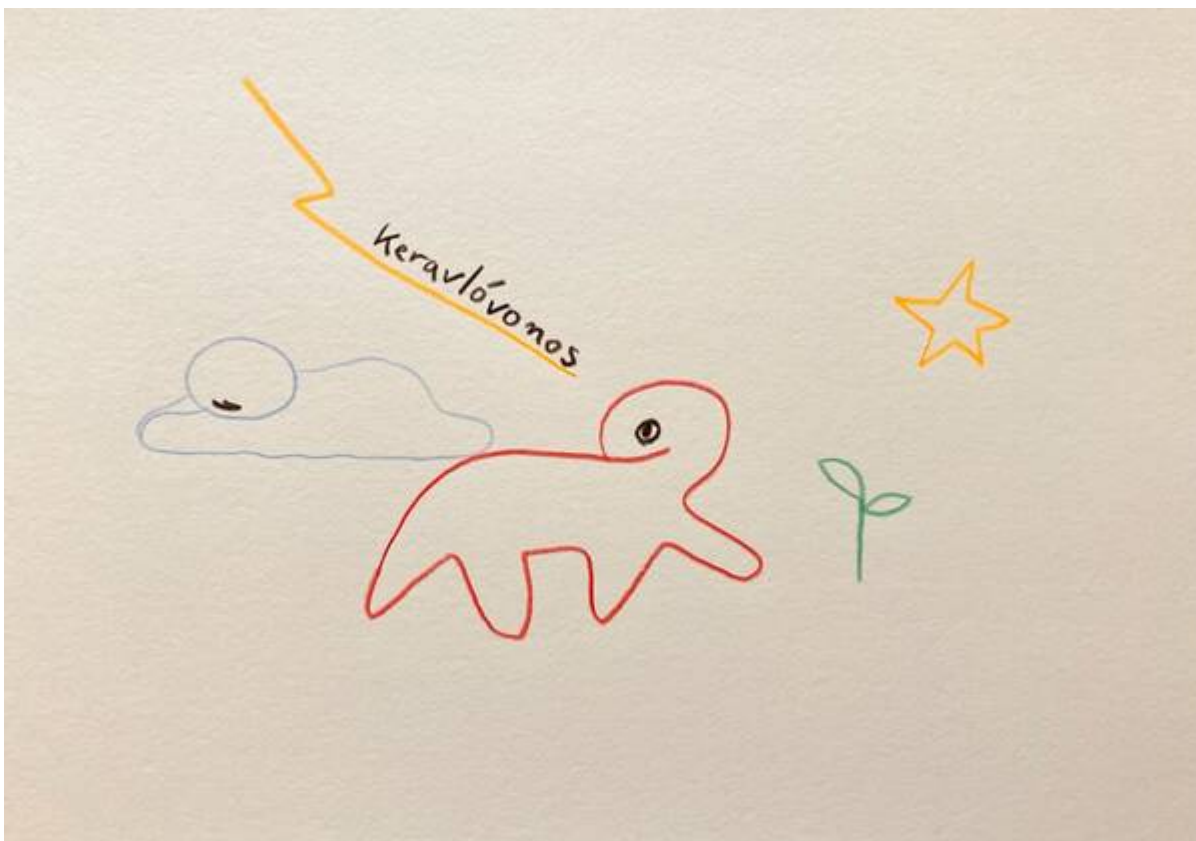
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Room 10 - Keravlónomos

The story doesn't begin with lightning, but with breath. In a small Greek village near Kalamata lives Giorgos, 74 years old, alone in a house with white walls and quiet rooms. He was an electrician for most of his life. People used to say: "He doesn't talk much - but when he does, it's true." Now he hardly speaks at all. His voice clings to the edge of his mouth like a child unsure whether it's allowed to interrupt. This morning, mist lies over the valley. Giorgos steps out barefoot; the grass is cool underfoot. On the hill stands a single, rusty lightning rod - inactive for decades. Giorgos installed it himself, back in 1982, when his son was born. He stands still.
